




Anjali Menon is an Indian film director and screenwriter who predominantly works in the Malayalam film industry. She made her directorial debut with the film Manjadikuru. She won the National Film Award for Best Screenplay (Dialogues) for Ustad Hotel at the 60th National Film Awards. She was one of the founding members of the Women in Cinema Collective (WCC), an organization that focuses on gender equality in the Malayalam film industry. She made her feature debut with Manjadikuru (2008), a coming of age drama set in 1979. It won the FIPRESCI award for the Best Malayalam film and Best Indian Debut. She also received Kerala State Film Award for Best Screenplay for the movie. Anjali's movies have depicted themes of the migrant experience and cross cultural interactions. Her film company Little Films India is based in Mumbai and Kochi.

Anjali Menon, the filmmaker and Anjali Menon the person, do you perceive the world and people around you through the same lens? Let our readers know a bit about you, your family, likes and dislikes.

Be it 'Manjadikuru', 'Ustad Hotel' or 'Bangalore Days', Anjali Menon's screenplay and dialogues have become synonyms of prestigious awards. What is your magic ingredient which infuses such life and depth to the movies?

I prefer to keep my private and professional lives apart for the simple reason of privacy. But I am fortunate that my experiences do power me to explore themes that are personal through cinema.

You spent your formative years in UAE. What kind of impact did it make on your creative instincts in the long run?

Having grown up in multiple cultures a hybrid consciousness is the gift you get but along with it also comes a sense of limbo. In me it translates into a need for connection with my culture and movies become a medium for that.

I have seen authenticity and relatability as an audience member and I try to find that I movies I watch. So when I make a film I am simply trying to achieve the same.

With the advent of OTT platforms and webseries format, what are the changes the industry might face in coming years? Is this going to be helpful for the ones who want to bring stories around new, untouched topics which are experimental in nature?

I think it's a great leveler as filmmakers from everywhere now have equal access and opportunity to reach their audience. So, content is what will really rule. The audience will decide based on how good the content is and not anything else. Also it cuts out all the middle men who profess to know about the market and what it "needs". It increases the life of a film way beyond its weekend box office run which if affected by a million factors other than the film itself.

In context of 'Manjadikuru' of not doing well at the 'Box- Office', as an entrepreneur and an artist, do you feel that financial success does affect the artists and their art-form? How can an artist be mentally prepared and stay afloat in the tide until waves begin to flow in favor? Like, until an 'Ustad Hotel' in your case?

It takes a lot of grit and tenacity, but what funnily enough I think is, what empowers it best is childlike buoyancy to life and what it gives to you. It is so important to keep that spirit alive within. Only then will one enjoy the success when it arrives.

Your stories are inspired by things around you and your characters are a reflection of your actors from their real life, how do you pick up the flavor for your dialogue writing? Is it character based, or premise based?



Our society often looks up to a larger than life figure as an idol, role model or a leader in various walks of life. How important is it to break those clichés and look for a more collaborative and an inclusive leadership approach? How this stereotype perception regarding 'leadership' can be changed?

In my field of work, I know what it is like to be the minority or even the only one so the empathy helps. We are in a culture where a loud voice and an autocratic attitude can be mistaken for "leadership qualities", so it isn't easy to remain soft-spoken and democratic and yet get things done. Over time I am evolving my own way of leading. Currently it is to empower people to be able to contribute in collaboration with a shepherd style of leadership. I urge them to lead in their own department and if they are straying away from the intended direction, I nudge them back in. Not everyone understands a management style where you bring together people and make them care about the project enough to give their 100% to it. But it does bring about true synergy and facilitates growth of the individual with the group. Harvard Business School calls it leading from behind. But it is true that many who have not experienced such empowerment prefer the very limiting but familiar option of a leader who enslaves a team to execute his/her vision.

Always character based. Dialogues are like icebergs which only expose the essence of a character, there needs to always be more which is unsaid and under the water. Subtext is what makes dialogue rich.

Joining filmmaking has been a conscious decision for you. What made you choose this particular field in the creative arts?

Cinema has the power to transport people, to bring about seismic shifts within them through perception and emotion. That is such an incredible thing.


'Light' is your debut book as an author. When did the thought of writing a book come to you? Let the readers know a bit about your author journey and the people who played a major role in this.

Being a part of the creative Industry for many years this was an organic shift to another media of expression. It was a spontaneous 'Stream of Consciousness' experience during the lockdown phase. Words leapt out in a frenzy which formed the many short stories as if on an inner cue! They are a series of short stories woven from the fabric of our society. Some dark, some intriguing and some heart-wrenching. Stories are woven from her interaction over many years with women from diverse background pan India. The underlying theme of injustice and patriarchy reigns in most narratives. The pathos is evident throughout different premises and social constructs.

The underlying theme of a society built on suppression and unequal status is exposed in a series of heart-wrenching stories. I consider Shashi Deshpande, Kate Chopin, Attia Hosain, Sudha Murthy, Sri Aurobindo and Yuval Noah Harari as my literary mentors.

particularly women-centric?

As a woman, I have over the years gathered many incidences around other women. Some left me intrigued and some simply shocked me. As we move into the 21st century its time I think to start a dialogue around these difficult subjects, if not change society...at least make a dent in it! Women readers are heavily impacted by 'Light' as they can see a reflection of truth and society in the many narratives. And the title description – A bit of fact, a bit of fiction is justified! Readers especially women like the stark depiction, and the need for open conversations around topics ranging from child-abuse to unequal status in marriages, financial exploitation, early marriages, women's health and widow status in modern India.

Supriya's story is a depiction of how collective consciousness works...as the new age woman will no longer play the victim card but rise as a 'hero' and save herself.

How has your experience in publication, advertising and media helped you as a writer?

Tremendously, as having worked on many aspects of communication through different medias, my visualizing capabilities have been enhanced over the years.

Today as a writer I am able to combine all the techniques into one medium of expression, hence my short stories can be adapted to screenplays and use a visual medium to depict the unsaid effectively.

Your book is an example of 'Less is More'. Is this your particular style of writing or you deliberately picked it up for the dark and realistic stories in your book, 'LIGHT'?

Yes! – I honestly believe less is more!! The stories are dark in nature; hence I want to leave the audience with a sensation and not overwhelm them with too much details. This leaves scope both for Screenplay writer as well as the Director to have some creative liberties.

Do you think there is something as 'Readers Block'? With the plethora of visual mediums around us, do you feel reading has taken a backseat?

Yes! – I honestly believe less is more!! Visual mediums are enticing but nothing compared to the way an individual chooses to see his/her story. The only reason reading can take a back seat is if you don't like reading!







What was the most difficult part of publishing process for you? How can a budding author reach out to more readers using marketing strategies?




Are you working on anything at the present you would like to share with your readers about?

So, it was not a very difficult or overwhelming thing to create promotional strategies for my book. However I would say, bifurcate both the tasks. 
your journey as a writer?

She has worked on enhancing self-esteem and social skills via education among the young adults in the largest slum area of Eastern India. With a BSc Honors in Geography from Calcutta University, a Degree in Interior Design from Sheffield School of Design, New York, a Degree in both Spanish and German, she started her career as an Interior Designer. Later after having travelled extensively she started her own travel concern, 'Creative Escapes' and specialized in curating holidays with a difference for Women Groups. While running these enterprises successfully, she walked into the social sector as a result of her real life experiences of daily interaction with different communities.



CHOSEN SPIRITS Dystopian

"Dystopia is pornographic, Olamina. You see it and shiver but it's also kind of fun because it's happening somewhere else, to someone else, you know? It requires distance. Some of us are actually sitting in the fucking middle of it and we may never learn to care in time. This isn't dystopia. This is reality."

Who would have thought that the times we live now would be so drastic from just a year ago, but it happened. Now imagine the same years of 2020, known in the future as "Years Not To Be Discussed" seems shocking isn't it? Samit Basu's Chosen Spirits is set 10 years in the future. Given the probability of artistic freedom and embellishment that's the backbone of any narrative, the story revolving around Joey and Rudra, feels something straight out of a movie. But it is not these characters that catch the reader's attention, it's the circumstances they face and the world they live in. Samit Basu does not refer to his story as dystopia but as "best case scenario" and the argument makes sense. While dystopia has a world building concentrated on the elements derived out of worst case scenarios of our current reality like in the case of Margret Atwood's The Handmaids Tale, or George Orwell's 1984 and Animal Farm, what stands out in this book is the likelihood of Samit Basu's "best case scenario" becoming our future reality.

"They say they've seen all this before-the fear of speaking out, the fear of people around you, the fear that you'd wake up one morning to find you'd lost everything- no bank account, no citizenship, no job, no rights. It's fear they live with, just like the fear, in their twenties, of a terrorist bomb in every market, every empty car, back when terrorists and the government were on different sides. Letting this fear get to you, letting it dictate your actions, isolate you, leech away your life... those were the things they have learnt to

However, the ugly reality behind the supposed scientifically advanced equipment comes at the cost of giving up control of our life and our privacy. In the book, Narad is a tattoo on your wrist that reads your mood and suggests solutions. There's the most important Flow that livestreams an influencer's whole life.

There are Augers, which are basically accountants of religion that track your good deeds, give you points which in turn decide how good or bad your future on Earth is going to be. They seem interesting but all these feed the personal data to the government who then sells it to third parties. This kind of scandal is something we are all too familiar with, there is an outrage, then comes assurance, and then it's life as usual while our data is still being sold.

While the technological advancements in the book are marvellous the author has retained the extremist elements from today's time. The world after 10 years is still the world of lynchings, terrorists, hackers, religious fanatics, sexual harassments, pogroms, pandemics, rape gangs, crowd sourced robberies, vandals from the culturally outraged, etc. only more brazen. For the sake of this review, I have refrained from talking about the characters because my intention is to focus on the world depicted in the book. Even character driven, the importance is found in the realisation that present or future, the grim times are upon us but there is hope, the fight is still alive and there will always be people standing for what is right. As Joey's mother wisely advises "stand your ground, and hold on, instead of running away."
